If you suspect that your dog has eaten something poisonous, grab a sample of the plant he was eating or chewing on and take the dog and plant to your veterinarian. If he has vomited, put a plastic bag over your hand, collect the vomit, turn the bag inside out so the sample is now inside—then secure the bag. If your dog is having seizures, is in distress or unconscious, call ahead so the vet will be ready when you arrive. You can also contact the ASPCA Poison Control Centre at the University of Illinois at 888-426-4435. There is a \$60 consultation fee, but the Centre is open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.
